## Project Overview

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**Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?**

Maize is an important source of calories and planted by nearly every farming household in the Federal Capital Territory, Abuja. However, its productivity is very low in the district due to declining soil fertility, use of rudimentary planting tools and heterogeneity in plant stands because of seed clumping. Oklahoma State University has developed a hand planter that is capable of singulating maize seeds thus improving homogeneity of plant stands and mid-season application of urea fertilizer. Research reports by Omara et al. (2016) indicated that developing world farmers can increase maize grain yield by 25% by adopting and using the Greenseeder hand planter in addition to benefits such as improved health and reduced environmental degradation through efficient delivery of fertilizer. The ultimate result of using the Greenseeder hand planter is increased economic and rural community development through improved crop production by the farming community in Federal Capital Territory, Abuja.

With an initial donation of 25 Greenplanters by Oklahoma State University to 25 farmers, this project envisages the production of hand planters by local entrepreneurs in Nigeria using the 25 donated hand planters as templates, thus enhancing economic development in the rural areas of Nigeria.

## Sustainability

#### Project planning

##### Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Need for increased maize grain yield, reduce expenses in maize production, reduce soil degradation that is high due to indigenous planting methods and traditional hand hoeing. The project would potentially solve long term health related issues arising from application of chemically treated seeds and fertilizer with bare hands. Additionally, it will improve the long-term soil health as well as reduce pollution in the air by avoiding excessive application of fertilizers by hand.

##### How did your project team identify these needs?

Conducting a baseline survey on food security in general and focusing on challenges affecting maize production in Federal Capital Territory, Abuja specifically.

##### How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Members of the benefiting community were involved in finding solutions through a baseline survey done by

Aungwan Fulani, Aungwan Beri Beri, Karu and Bwari communities of the Federal Capital Territory, Abuja (CCFN/ISD-Abuja, Nigeria) in January of 2019. A pilot project has moved forward via the preliminary manufacture of hand planters in 2018. In addition, four hand planters were tested in Osun state in 2018 and that have been used extensively. This technology was considered to be highly applicable for Abuja, Nigeria growing conditions. Throughout this process farmers had the opportunity to share about the technology and expressed a desire for planters of their own. This was the impetus for our current project proposal; which would run as a scaled-up implementation with lessons learned from the pilot.

**How were community members involved in planning the project?**

Twenty representative farmers in Federal Capital Territory, Abuja, Nigeria. This includes 10 female farmers and 10 male farmers from a formerly conflict affected area.

**Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.**

There can be value in working with other groups including governments, nonprofit organizations, and private companies.

We value local coordination in our project. We have coordinated with CCFN and ISD on previous work. It is through this work that we decided together that an additional project was needed with more financial resources. Not enough hand planters were provided to farmers in the previous project. If funded, this project



will spur local production of the hand planters using locally sourced materials which will ensure sustainability of the impact created.

**Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.**

The training that will be provided by the farmer advisers or field extension workers on how to improve planting practices and to sustainably improve crop yields, focusing mostly on maize and beans. In general, the trainers will provide knowledge to farmers on how to optimize planting space, how the Green Seeder works, how to control weeds through application of herbicide and how to apply fertilizer to increase maize grain yields.

**How were these needs identified?**

Needs were identified through a pilot project that was completed by Yahaya Yakubu as a representative of CCFN and ISD. This project helped identify the needs of the local farmers for a labor-saving device and a more efficient way to apply fertilizer. Numerous discussions between CCFN staff members and farmers identified the most pressing needs for improving maize production.

**What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or publicity), will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the project?**

The main incentive for the farmers involved in the project is to be able to keep the hand planters once the two years of the project are completed and the consistent increased corn grain yields as a result of using the Greenseeder planter. They will also receive inorganic fertilizer for a portion of their corn fields that they devote to the field-testing site. With the development of locally manufactured hand planters they will have the opportunity to obtain one of the hand planters if they did not receive one of the initial 25 hand planters.

**List any community members or community groups that will oversee the continuation of the project after grant-funded activities conclude.**

These may or may not be Rotary members. CCFN Abuja, Nigeria will continue to be engaged with the farmers in the project area as they have similar food security projects running in the same communities.

Vocational Training Teams

**Project implementation**

**Describe the training needs that the team will address.**

The training team will address the following factors:

- Proper planting distance and depth using the Greenseeder hand planter.
- Fertilizer placement, and proper in season application of fertilizer with the Greenseeder Hand planter.
- Guidance in how to use and maintain the Greenseeder hand planter for best results.
- Setting up side by side field comparisons of the farmer planting method versus the Greenseeder, and that further encumbers a highly refined method of N fertilization using urea mid-season, and that maximizes nitrogen use efficiency.

**How did your team identify these needs?**

Our team identified these training needs through the implementation of the initial pilot project.

**Describe the specific objectives of the training, including what you expect training participants to gain from the team's expertise.**

The Objectives of the training include:

- Proper planting distance and depth using the Greenseeder hand planter. Farmer training participants will learn from the training team about the importance of seed planting and plant population optimization to reduce competition of crops for nutrients and space.
- Guidance in how to use the Greenseeder hand planter for best results. The participants will learn how to assemble the hand planter, maintain the hand planter, use the planter in an upright stance and with the proper rocking motion to cycle the planter to ensure correct seed and fertilizer placement and minimize user

discomfort.

- Fertilizer placement, and proper in-season application of fertilizer with the Greenseeder Hand planter. The participants will learn about corn plant nutrition needs and the benefits of split application of smaller amounts of inorganic fertilizer, increasing N uptake and minimizing fertilizer run off into local water bodies and minimizing volatilization losses from urea
- Setting up side by side field comparisons of the farmer planting method and use of Greenseeder planting and fertilizer application methodology. The farmer participants will learn how the project team will conduct testing and what data is important. The farmers will also be encouraged to have local ownership of the testing and that they are a valued part of the project. This will lead to increased capacity for the local farmers.

### **How were members of the local community involved in planning the training?**

Local community members have been involved in planning out training by their involvement as the initial farmers involved in the 2018 pilot project. They have had discussion with Fikayo Oyebiyi and with CCFN field extension staff and the director of CCFN Abuja, Nigeria

### **Will you work in coordination with any related initiatives in the community?**

### **Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.**

There can be value in working with other groups including governments, nonprofit organizations, and private companies.

CCFN Abuja, Nigeria has ongoing projects in these communities concerning increasing competitiveness of conflict affected farmers in soybean and goat production. This Greenseeder hand planter tool could also be used to plant soybeans which saves time for farmers needing to plant in a timely manner.

### **What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or promotion) will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the training?**

Most of the community members as farmers and small scale entrepreneurs will therefore directly avail of the benefits of the project enumerated above. The farmers will own the harvest from test plots planted with hybrid seeds and treated with fertilizer and herbicides. They will also own the planters at the end of the training and testing.

To encourage other members of the community in participating in this project, they will be invited to the training of the farmers and will also be educated on the advantages to them - the greater availability of maize, and more employment in the community -- due to farmers using the hand planters. They will be provided the training brochures on agronomy that they can refer to during and at the end of the project.

### **How will training recipients be supported after the training to keep the skills they acquire up-to-date?**

Training recipients will receive ongoing visits through two growing seasons during the two-year duration of the project. This will total 8 visits per farmer over the two-year period. During these visits the technical team will provide informal feedback to the farmers and participatory discussion about what is going well and what is not going well. Then there will be joint discussion about how to move forward. In this way the farmer learns together and reinforces what they have learned through experience and discussion with the technical team.

These may or may not be Rotary members or clubs, CCFN and local farmer groups will be involved in further training after the project ends in December 2021.

The maintenance plan for the hand planters will be managed by receiving feedback from farmers on any necessary repairs or improvements. This information will be collected and passed back to the local manufacturer in order to fix the planter. In addition, Oklahoma State University will provide technical support through contact with CCFN and Fikayo Oyebiyi to advise on any needed repairs on in country manufacturing issues.

Replacement parts will be available from the local manufacturer. Any expense from this will come out of funds for Equipment and supplies.
